Rector's Annual Report for 2022

Blessed be God the Word, who came to his own and his own received him not - for in this way God glorifies the stranger. O God, show us your image in all who come to us today, that we may welcome them and you. ~ Prayer of St. Gregory's

First, I want to express my deep and continuing gratitude for the gift and blessing to serve as the Rector of St. Mark's. I am in my 12th year of ministry at St. Mark's and continue to feel called to ministry here in this place and energized by the opportunities that are in front of us as a community of faith. I'm blessed to work with a very talented and dedicated staff that love what they do, are extremely creative, and care deeply for the well-being of our faith community. I am also deeply grateful for the loving care this congregation has shown and continues to show toward my family. We treasure St. Mark's and are so happy to be part of this community and to share in its life and ministries.

I am grateful for the two talented vestry wardens Lucy Sinkular and Laurel Leisher-Cabral who have helped to guide the vestry through the challenging times of Covid and kept us productive and moving forward. Lucy Sinkular has been a very dedicated Sr. Warden and will continue in the coming year to serve in this capacity. She is not only organized and hard-working but is deeply grounded in her faith and loves the church. She is passionate about helping others to find places of service that fit their gifts for ministry and it is a joy to work alongside her at St. Mark's.

I do not want to pretend that it has been an easy year "rising to the challenge" of regrouping after two years of Covid shutdowns and stresses. However, I am so pleased that we have found ourselves growing and vital after some pretty challenging times. There are so many people to thank for this year's success and I cannot list them all and would be afraid to leave someone out but I am thankful for all of those who offered hospitality to this community on Sunday mornings including coffee teams, greeters, ushers, altar guild, lectors, eucharistic ministers, choir, AV desk volunteers, acolytes and other servants of worship. It takes a great many people to make Sunday morning Eucharists and coffee hour happen but more than that it takes awareness and initiative toward the stranger and the newcomer to Widen our Welcome of St. Mark's. I'm grateful for everyone's efforts on behalf of the whole community.

This past week I quietly celebrated my 22nd Anniversary of Ordination to the Sacred Order of the Priesthood. What a blessing to be serving in a place full of life and vitality where I feel not only supported but also encouraged and challenged to keep growing and moving deeper into the life of faith. Thank you for this opportunity to serve in this fabulous community. As I look toward the next 10 years at St. Mark's, I see great opportunities ahead as we continue "Building Something Beautiful for God in our Neighborhood."

First, a quick look back. Rising to the Challenge.

We did in fact **Rise to the Challenge** of 2022, regathering our St. Mark's community and welcoming many new households into our midst along the way. We've grown this past year in numbers (our weekly attendance is now approaching our pre-covid levels), worship is robust and powerful and our financial life is stronger than ever. St. Mark's is an amazing parish and I'm grateful that so many of you have stepped up to help where help is needed. Many of you have offered classes for our adults and for youth, continuing the strength of our formation programs here at St. Mark's. We've learned many new things about worship in a hybrid context and about how to reach out to one another from our isolation and back into connection. This past fall we welcomed our Diocesan Bishop Michael Hunn for Confirmations (5), Receptions (3) and Reaffirmation of Baptismal vows (4) in a joyous liturgy that demonstrated the ongoing vitality of St. Mark's.

...Reconnecting with Joy.

We are still joyfully welcoming long-time members who are returning to church after the broken rhythms of covid are finally overcome. This past summer we enjoyed our 10th Summer of Conversation initiative at St. Mark's, during which well over 300 one-on-one relational meetings took place that deepened the communal

life of this parish and built lasting connections between our members. We desire to be a parish marked by a "thick network or relationships and loving care," rather than a loose collection of anonymous worshipers. I'm grateful for the verve and intensity that St. Mark's showed in Reconnecting with Joy this past summer and beyond.

...Reaching Out in Love

Clearly St. Mark's is called to serve the world in Christ's love. This is abundantly clear when you talk to our members and the ways that they are involved in the community whether it be tutoring kids, delivering meals, sponsoring refugee families, or providing transportation. St. Mark's continues to reach out in love through our St. Mark's Montessori School, our largest outreach program. It serves more than 40 pre-k students each day and offers quality education and spiritual formation each week. This past year we've become more involved in ministry with Asylum Seekers and have found a place of outreach to our unhoused neighbors through Church Unbound, a weekly Episcopal Worship service on Sunday afternoons sponsored by the Diocese of the Rio Grande. We continue to open our building to numerous 12-step groups and other community-based organizations that do the most important work of helping people stay healthy and to heal. I'm also very grateful for the ongoing outreach ministry of Take Them a Meal that enables our own parishioners to take care of others who are going through a crisis and could use a prepared meal and some loving care.

Widening our Welcome

Our theme for this coming year of 2023 is Widening our Welcome. What do we mean by this?

First, we are expanding our outreach budget and planning to develop an Outreach Ministry Team to not only designate where we will give funds but also to help us get more involved personally with outreach in our Albuquerque community. If you are interested in helping to provide leadership for outreach, please let one of our clergy know.

Second, for many years we have recognized the need to renew our own liturgical space, take care of our pipe organ, work toward full accessibility for all our members and attend to deferred maintenance issues in our worship space.

With the purpose of renewing and renovating St. Mark's worship space and environs in our 75th year, the Rector and Vestry of St. Mark's has commissioned a Building Renewal Committee to carry out a process of discernment and design guided by gifted sacred space consultant Robert Habiger. We are working to widen our welcome and upgrade our facilities in a way that strengthens our connection to God and each other for generations to come.

- Purpose Statement: As a vibrant and growing faith community the time is now for us to work together to determine how best to sustain, modify, and transform the physical structure of Saint Marks to meet our growing internal needs and our increasing role in service to the larger community and the diocese. We are passionate about our work to "Widen our Welcome" of St. Mark's and upgrade our facilities in a way that strengthens our connection to God and to each other for generations to come.

Third, we desire to keep growing as a faith community, to welcome all who walk through our doors into a loving and supportive community where they can explore their faith and find resources and relationships to encourage their hearts and minds. We hope to expand our Newcomer ministries in ways that help us to connect better with newcomers and to invite them into the journey faith with the people of St. Mark's.

Fourth, one of the ways we want to Widen our Welcome is by demonstrating that we are caring for the earth as God's beloved creation. With this in mind we hope to renew our Creation Care Ministry this coming year with a group of motivated parishioners who will help to identify needs on our own campus and in our life

together while at the same time encouraging each of us to care for the earth as individuals in our own homes and lives with more intention and care. We are wanting to do some beautifying of our grounds, greatly enhance our recycling efforts, begin a parish composting program, start preparing for a new solar array and covered parking area with EV chargers, look for efficiency projects and more. If you are interested in being part of our emerging Creation Care Ministry, please let Fr. Christopher or Ken Reese know.

Fifth, We plan to use this 75th Year of Ministry for St. Mark's Episcopal Church to discover new ways of being a church and to build on our rich and progressive history as a leader in the Diocese of the



Rio Grande. Over the year we will celebrate our history and look toward our future together.

This coming year I'm looking forward to how St. Mark's will **Widen our Welcome**: by reaching out in love more and more as a community as we expand our outreach efforts, by planning for more beautiful and intimate worship space that is accessible to all, by improving our welcome of newcomers to our parish and involving more members in this ministry beyond just Sunday morning, and by re-energizing our efforts at Creation Care. The coming year will be one of growth, learning and joy with God's grace and our faithful efforts to be God's people in this place. Together we are Building Something Beautiful for God in our Neighborhood.

Senior Warden's Report

Dear Fellow Members of the St. Mark's Family,

The second year of my service as your Senior Warden has come to its close. Those who are old hands at all things Episcopal will know the Senior Warden job is one of some organizational importance. Those of you newer to our faith tradition may like to hear a bit more. As the Senior Warden, I am the "chair" for the Vestry meetings, and I do my best to see that things keep moving along in an orderly fashion, that no important business is left undone and that we focus on what is most important in service to you. There is another facet to the job, though, and it is the more important one in my opinion. I try to organize things such that Fr. Christopher has what he needs to minister to all of us, to meet our spiritual needs and to be as effective and fulfilled in his job as our Rector as is possible.

I am very grateful that service on Vestry includes a strong focus on the spiritual health and growth of the members. We don't just show up at meetings and get down to business, like a secular board of directors might. We begin our meetings with a period of fellowship and conversation. Then, Fr. Christopher leads us through a time of spiritual formation when we study and pray together. This time brings us a clearer sense of our shared purpose, and the prayers and questions also open our hearts and eyes to see what God may be calling us to do. Christ is at the center of all our work as your Vestry!

I would like to highlight a few important accomplishments of our Vestry this last year. We continue the important and ongoing task of oversight for the parish's finances. This takes time and attention each month, but it is time well spent as we begin new efforts. Last January we began the process to find a liturgical design consultant to assist the community as we consider building renewal. We were blessed to find and hire Robert Habiger for this important role, and I'm sure you will read and learn more about him during Annual Meeting and in the coming weeks.

In March we formed a small committee to develop guidance for the functioning of St. Mark's committees and ministries. This resulted in the vestry passing a policy in September whereby committees are all urged to begin their meetings with prayer and spiritual focus. Then committees will provide notes of decisions they make whenever recommending the Vestry take a certain action. This communication from committees to the Vestry will help ensure Vestry makes decisions based on the input from the lay people directly involved in a committee's particular work.

Vestry members supported the Summer of Conversation by undertaking one on one conversations with parishioners, new and old alike. We support this strong ministry which makes St. Mark's a real community and not just a bunch of people gathered under a roof each Sunday.

The work of the Building Renewal Committee will be ongoing and span the terms of successive Vestry members. For this reason, the Vestry looked well beyond its current members and worked with Fr. Christopher to draw participation of diverse parishioners as committee members. That important work will reach to the future through the decades as the renewed space provides a gathering and worship space for the next generations of St. Mark's members.

In June the Vestry voted to support work on classroom remodel in our St. Mark's Montessori School. The school is the church's largest outreach ministry and serves a vital role in the lives of families in our area. The school staff provide youngsters a high quality, early childhood educational experience and also provide the children and their families with dynamic spiritual instruction as they reflect God's love to these small scholars.

The Vestry assisted in welcoming Bishop Michael Hunn this Fall for the occasion of baptisms, confirmations and receptions. Other work in the Fall included support of the stewardship volunteers in planning and implementing this year's campaign. The Vestry adamantly supported the use of financial resources to ensure staff is fairly paid in this high-inflation economy. Our staff (ordained and lay people alike) work hard ministering to our members and to the larger community. We want to take care of them and ensure they know we see and appreciate every one of them.

We are a diverse group at St. Mark's! I am so proud to serve as the Senior Warden in this community where all people truly are welcome. I hope you each will consider how God may be calling you to participate in the life of the church. How do you see yourself contributing to the work of our Faith Community? Let's talk about that!

Often the talks given or workshops offered are engaging and helpful to each parish in their ongoing life and ministry. St. Mark's sends delegates to represent us at Diocesan Convention. Our Delegates are the Senior Warden, Jr. Warden, the Clergy active and retired as well as two elected Delegates to Convention from our congregation. If you would like to be a part of Diocesan Convention, consider running for Delegate in a future year. Recently, the convention has also allowed visitors to attend much of the program whether you are an elected delegate or not. This has enriched the church and broadened the appeal of this annual event.

The Deanery structure is an attempt to make the diocese smaller and to offer a way for churches in a given geographical area to work together, share resources and learn together. Recently the North West Deanery of which we are a part has offered trainings and continuing education opportunities for all members of our deanery. Churches generally take turns hosting the deanery meetings which consist of a business meeting, Eucharist and meal. Those normally invited to attend deanery meeting are the clergy of the parish and our elected diocesan delegates. Treasurer's Report

2022! The world was just beginning to recover from the Pandemic. And still, St. Mark's continued to thrive. Our budget for 2022 called for a \$13,000 deficit and we actually ended the year with a surplus of \$8,000.00! This outstanding outcome was a result of the overwhelming generosity of our community. Expenses were down in a large part because of our exceedingly generous Business Manager, Ken Reese, who volunteered his time to do the job in 2021 and 2022. I can't thank Ken enough for moving into the position and doing such an amazing job. He will be stepping down this spring and his will be very difficult shoes to fill.

The budget for 2022 included a draw from our Investment Account of \$22,500, but that money was not needed for operations. For the last two years, the Vestry has been envisioning improvements that could be made to our facility. To that end, it is likely that some of the surplus from 2022 and also the budgeted draw from 2022 will be used to add to our new capital fund called Worship and Facility Planning.

St. Mark's budget for 2023 is a reflection of our community's strong commitment to this year's theme for Stewardship; Rising to the challenge, Reconnecting with Joy and Reaching Out with Love. Our giving goal was increased over last year by \$80,000 and was met and then exceeded! In 2023 we are increasing the budget for outreach, giving cost-of-living raises to all of the staff and also hiring a new assistant organist to continue to grow our blossoming music ministry. After all of these additions the budget shows a surplus of \$1,375.00.

This community offers encouragement, support, love, fun and the sharing of our lives with one another. It is unapparelled in its vibrance, welcome, and spiritual support. Our pledges support all that we do together and are also an indicator of our personal commitment to being good stewards of what God has given us. We have received 136 pledges for 2023 and we'd like to see that number grow to 150. Every gift is important as we strive to become a sustainable congregation for years to come. I personally urge you to prayerfully consider turning in a pledge if you have not yet done so.

We continue to maintain our large facility with the help of our Facilities Manager, Leo C'de Baca, and various volunteers that we are grateful we can rely on when needs arise.



St. Mark's completed the following major repairs in 2022:

- Chair Lift \$14,593
- New crown molding and Gallery Hanging System for the icons on the north wall of the Nave and Loop Hearing System installed \$10,000
- New Palatino Conservatory Grand Piano \$9,000
- New HVAC Unit for Offices. \$11,864
- New Classroom space and Improvements to the school \$16,406
- New Lawn in Fish Garden \$4,800

We have seen a reduction in outside groups meeting at the church, but this allowed us to complete a sponsorship with Cub Scouts Pack

990 which will begin meeting in our facility by February. We also were able to allow several diocesan groups to meet in our facility this year that had not taken place in the past.

Looking Ahead: Building Renewal Committee

With the purpose of renewing and renovating St. Mark's worship space and environs in our 75th year, the Rector and Vestry of St. Mark's have commissioned a Building Renewal Committee to carry out a process of discernment and design guided by gifted sacred space consultant Robert Habiger. We are working to widen our welcome and upgrade our facilities in a way that strengthens our connection to God and each other for generations to come.

• Purpose Statement: As a vibrant and growing faith community the time is now for us to work together to determine how best to sustain, modify, and transform the physical structure of St. Mark's to meet our growing internal needs and our increasing role in service to the larger community and the diocese. We are passionate about our work to "Widen our Welcome" of St. Mark's and upgrade our facilities in a way that strengthens our connection to God and to each other for generations to come.

• Objectives:

- **Sustainment** To identify, prioritize and address the elements of the present physical structure that require urgent repair or replacement.
- Accessibility To have a space that (a) allows for all people to participate in the worship service and have easy access during communion, (b) provides greater connection of the clergy to the congregation, (c) that is welcoming as one enters the worship space and (d) allows participation of all the people in all other church activities outside of worship
- Flexibility To have a space that (a) can be easily configured to meet a range of worship needs in terms of intimacy, connection, size and spiritual practices and (b) that can be configured to meet needs outside of worship of the St Marks community and our larger community outside of St Marks (conferences, concerts, lectures, outreach, gathering place for larger community, etc.)
- Music To maintain organ music as central to St Marks worship and to have a space that intimately integrates music (choir, organ, soloist, instrumentalists, etc.) with the congregation and worship.
- **Beauty** To have a space where the placement and presentation of liturgical and religious symbols enhances the worship across the range of spiritual practices.
- Balance A space that respects present and traditional configuration and modes of worship while addressing the needs of worship space for the future.

LGBTQ+ Ministry of the Diocese of the Rio Grande

Summer of Conversation

One foundation of the vibrant community of St. Mark's is our diligence in the spiritual practice of initiating intentional "one-on-one" conversations with others in the community. For many years, we've commissioned a team of members at the beginning of each summer to initiate these conversations and relational meetings with other members of St. Mark's as part of our "Summer of Conversation."

In 2022, we decided to broaden responsibility for the success of this community building initiative by commissioning the ENTIRE congregation-adults, youth, and children-to participate in the Summer of

Conversation. The results were fantastic. A "Summer of Conversation" Bingo card, two Summer of Conversation Training Sessions, sample Conversation Starter Cards and a series of Sunday Morning "Conversation Cafes" helped motivate even the more introverted among us to get involved. Over the course of the Summer, members of St. Mark's engaged in 200+ intentional "one-on-one" conversations.

While our intentional conversations are by NO means limited to summertime, we find that making a communal commitment to an intentional season of conversation each year helps energize and equip us for more meaningful connections with others in the community all year long. Begin thinking now about what your commitment to this year's Summer of Conversation might look like. Consider how the Spirit might be nudging YOU to stretch and grow as together we strive to nurture strong, authentic relationships that will support both personal and communal growth and transformation both within and beyond the walls of St. Mark's.

Worship

Welcoming the full participation and gifts of all of our members to sustain a robust worship life that nourishes souls and glorifies God.

Music

The musicians of St. Mark's served the parish faithfully and well in 2022.

The St. Mark's Choir led the music of every Sunday liturgy during the year. The Choir also sang in numerous special liturgies, including Ash Wednesday, Tenebrae, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, Christmas Eve, and many others. The Choir was especially proud of the music prepared for Bishop Hunn's visit in October. Other special events included the Ralph Vaughan Williams' Magnificat during Advent with soloist Jacqueline Zander-Wall.



The Choir continues to grow and flourish. The choir welcomed numerous new members this year and seeks to provide a warm welcome and helpful resources to new singers. Among those resources are complimentary introductory lessons with Hannah Stephens. During 2022 the choir resumed wearing robes and began to participate in liturgical processions, both of which had been paused during COVID. Several soloists from the choir sang psalms and other liturgical music in various services.

St. Mark's musicians also provided instrumental music throughout the year. Asher Barreras and Rowan McJimsey played the piano in liturgies, coffee hour, and other events. Deb Bluestone played the viola on Christmas Eve and other occasions. A brass group played loudly on Easter morning. Other special offerings included wonderful solos by the students of Jacqueline Zander-Wall at the Christmas Eve children's service. These are only a few examples of the wonderful music provided by many musicians throughout the year. In the coming year the parish will welcome John Garlisch as Assistant Music Director. John will lead choir rehearsals and play the organ primarily in Jeremy's absence, but on some occasions Jeremy and John will lead services together.

A new Palatino grand piano was purchased in September 2022 and has been a fabulous addition to the music of St. Mark's. The Reuter organ continues to function reasonably well, despite significant disrepair. The pipes of various ranks play unevenly and do not hold a tune. Some stops do not play at the correct pitch level and others are not the sound named by their stop tab. Some stops have "dead notes" that don't play, so pieces must be played in keys that don't require the dead notes. An organ technician from Texas, Jason Alden, examined the organ in late 2022 and discovered that many of the pipes currently in the organ are not the original pipes but rather were made for other instruments by companies other than Reuter. This is a

mystery. As the parish continues to plan a possible future renovation, careful consideration will need to be given to the future of the instrument.

Digital Ministry & Communications

The Communications area continued to do the weekly Messenger electronic newsletter, returned to hardcopy "refrigerator" schedule cards for Lent/Easter and Advent/Christmas in the hope that parishioners would have multiple ways to be aware of happenings around the parish. Postcards for the Great Vigil of Easter, Christmas Eve Liturgies and for stewardship's Celebration Sunday were created and mailed. We also sent parish-wide text messages for reminders on Bishop Hunn's visit, Gathering of the Greens, Luminaria bag cleanup, and the Caroling Party & Potluck.

Scammers were on the rise this year. There were several communications, both hardcopy and electronic, that went out to parishioners this year to warn of possible scams and how to not be a victim, and what to do you if you are. We take security seriously.

All Stewardship materials (pledge card, graphics-design, posters, giving envelopes, postcard mailing, companion-area of the website, etc.) were all crafted in-house.

The church and school websites' maintenance continued. We are hoping to utilize the "Home" page of the church website more effectively in 2023 - so that people won't need to sift through the website to find upcoming events.



Audio-Visual Team Ministry

During the year, the AV Team made sound and visuals available for those attending outside our walls. We did a total of 116 live streams, with 87 of those streaming sessions casting to both YouTube and Facebook. In April, we implemented a tool, Restream.io, which allowed the AV Team to stream to both Facebook and YouTube at the same time. The church's Facebook followers went from 694 at the beginning of the year to 744 followers by December 31. YouTube saw similar growth, in that we went from zero to 42 subscribers over the year. We have a regular following on both Facebook and YouTube.

We have roughly 8-10 people who attend weekly services online. One pledging parishioner, Eileen Cook, said: "Online worship brings me into the St. Mark's community in a meaningful way. I love how St. Mark's is inclusive in welcoming all at the Lord's Table, unlike my fundamentalist upbringing. Even though I'm not attending in person, I feel a part of the live and vitality of St. Mark's. I'm learning so much!"

Formation

Creating diverse opportunities for people of all ages to teach, learn, explore, connect and grow spiritually.

St. Mark's Montessori School (SMMS)



Our largest outreach ministry is St. Mark's Montessori School (SMMS). We are currently serving 41 children, an increase from the 34 students in our spring and summer programs. In response to the growing need in our community for high quality preschools, we remodeled our Primary (ages 3-Kindergarten) classroom, so that we may grow our ministry to include more families.

Since our founding in 2013, we've provided a high quality, affordable Montessori education to our community. At our school, children have opportunities to learn and explore through a wide variety of "hands-on"

experiences, encouraging their imaginations and inner creativity. We've created this environment through a combination of Dr. Maria Montessori's philosophies and her methodology. Our students are further nurtured by the School's Spiritual fellowship with our Church's dynamic clergy.

During this last calendar year SMMS began several new programs. We started a new literacy program with Ms. Ann Baneck to add additional reading support for our students and other children in our community. We began having Montessori professional development at the school from Mr. Seth Stambaugh. We also started facilitating team building events with our staff, and any staff members who elected to participate were blessed by Mother Sylvia. These events and a 23%+ pay increase have helped staff continuity. Nationwide, 2022 is known as the Great Resignation, and staff retention heavily impacted the childcare industry. Our role as an outreach ministry is to provide a service to help fill a need right here in our neighborhood.

The pandemic has brought some help in ways we had not encountered pre-pandemic, such as grant funding. We were awarded \$86,683.00 in NM state and federal grants and are awaiting additional grant funding for further classroom updating this summer. Governor Michelle Lujan Grisham last spring announced family-focused initiatives eliminating costs for child care for most New Mexico families, increasing capacity for child care services in areas lacking access, and supporting early childhood professionals. This dramatic expansion of cost-free services builds on prior work to deliver affordable child care to more New Mexico families, supporting tens of thousands more families across the state by doubling previous family eligibility for the state's Child Care Assistance Program. Our School has been able to increase our Child Care Assistant contracts from one student to 14 students.

Special thanks to Ken Reese for all of his volunteer work as our finance manager. Also, to Pat Catlett for her donations of two beautiful original art pieces to the school. Additionally, we would like to thank all of the school board members and teachers for all of their hard work this year. Lastly, we'd like to extend our gratitude to all of the staff of St. Mark's for their work in supporting our school throughout the year.

St. Mark's Montessori School (SMMS) Treasurer Report

The school had a challenging year financially, ending 2022 with a deficit of \$25,692. Fortunately the balance of \$53,928 in the school's "rainy day" fund is more than sufficient to cover this deficit. The reason for the 2022 deficit is almost entirely due to growth in personnel costs which were \$50k higher than budgeted. Due to inflation and the tight job market, we had to significantly raise our pay to be able to attract and retain quality teachers. To remedy this going forward, the school is planning an increase in tuition rates this summer and fall as well as pursuing grant funding. One grant in particular, the NM Childcare Supply Building Grant, will hopefully provide the funding to remodel our Classroom #2 to add a bathroom. This will allow us to more than double our capacity for students under 3 years old, an age group for which we always have a waiting list. Our current total enrollment sits at 40 students which we hope to grow to at least 48 students by the fall.

St. Mark's Montessori Children's Chapel



Children's Ministry doesn't only happen on Sundays at St. Mark's! Each week, Deacon David and Mother Sylvia actively minister to between 30 and 40 children, ages 1.5-6 (and their teachers) as part of St. Mark's Montessori School (SMMS) Chapel Program. Each Wednesday St. Mark's clergy lead three "Children's Chapel" classes for SMMS: one toddler class (ages ~1.5-3 years) and two primary classes (ages ~3-6).

In SMMS Children's Chapel, we seek to nurture children's innate spiritual capacities for curiosity and wonder, reverence and awe, care and carefulness. "Peace" is the golden thread that runs through everything we do in Montessori chapel. Our regular weekly sequence of rituals, exercises, and songs help children learn to "get ready" for a lifelong spiritual practice as they begin

to own and internalize essential tools for soothing their own nervous systems, calming their own bodies and minds, and creating peace both within themselves and in the world around them. A variety of Sacred Stories, usually shared in the Montessori method of Godly Play, invite children to make connections between their own personal experiences and the rich spiritual traditions of our ancestors both within and beyond the Jewish and Christian traditions. We close each session by passing a candle around the circle while we sing. (We use an LED candle with the Toddlers, and a real candle with the Primary classes). Through this simple practice we embody our values of carefulness, gentleness, reverence and sharing-the building blocks of a healthy spiritual and community life.

Small Groups: Anglican Rosary, Thursday Bible Study, Sunday Storytelling, Song Circle

Small groups support our spiritual growth by offering safe spaces where we can share our lives, prayers and spiritual journeys with others.

Our Anglican Rosary Group meets Tuesday mornings at 10am (Mountain Time) on Zoom, and includes local members of St. Mark's, as well as "out of town" friends from as far away as Florida. We begin each session by sharing our prayer requests. Members of the group then take turns leading prayers using the Anglican Rosary. After we've prayed 4-5 cycles of prayer together (~30 minutes) we enjoy a "check in" and conversation. Each gathering lasts ~45-60 minutes. Our Bible Study Group meets Thursdays at Noon (Mountain Time) in the chapel of St. Mark's AND on zoom. In 2022 we studied the Gospel of Luke (First Nations Version) and the Beatitudes, as well as Peaceful Communication and Simplicity as Spiritual Practices. We are beginning 2023 by studying the Gospel of Matthew (First Nations Version), then we'll see where the Spirit takes us from there! Our **Storytelling Group** meets on Sundays at 11:15am in the Library at St. Mark's. Together we learn, share, listen, and tell stories inspired by Holy Scripture and the Lives of the Saints. In 2022 we began exploring stories from the Hebrew Scriptures, with "Sordid Tales of Kings and Queens: Stories of the Davidic Monarchy". In 2023 we will begin by exploring stories of unusual saints (in Epiphany and Lent), followed by stories from the Acts of the Apostles in Eastertide. This is an excellent small group for people who long for

an imaginative way to enter more deeply into holy texts, for people who are interested in developing their own skills as a storyteller, and for people who just love to hear a good story!

Our <u>Music that Makes Community Song Circle</u> meets monthly on the first Tuesday of each month at 6:30pm. We initiated the group as an opportunity for people who participated in the Music that Makes Community retreat at the Norbertine Abbey in October of 2022 (as well as others in the ABQ area who feel drawn to the practice of community singing) to gather regularly for fellowship and music making. Participants include members of St. Mark's, as well as members from other congregations and communities throughout the ABQ area. We **rotate locations** and responsibility for "hosting" among interested participants. We focus on teaching, learning, and sharing songs together in an "oral tradition" style of music-making. We sing songs from a variety of traditions as well as songs of our own creation. We lean heavily on musical forms that lend themselves to learning by ear and singing from the heart, including: simple melodies, rounds, simple songs with layered harmonies, echo songs, and "call and response" songs. We take risks. We experiment. We make mistakes. We laugh. We learn. We encourage one another. We sing. We welcome you to join us!

If you feel called to initiate a new small group at St. Mark's, please contact a member of St. Mark's clergy. We'd love to help you get it started! Our dream is for every member of St. Mark's to belong to a small group that encourages, challenges, and strengthens their spiritual life!

Inquirers & Confirmation

We believe that Christian Formation is life-long and ongoing for every Christian. There is always more to learn, always more ways to grow into the "likeness of Christ." One of our primary tasks as Christians is to help each other understand and embrace the Christian life and faith. We do this by learning about the way of life that Jesus taught and endeavoring to lean into the habits and practices of a cross-centered life. Each year, usually in the fall, St. Mark's offers classes that helps newcomers and long-time members alike to learn more about the Episcopal Church and to enter more deeply into it spiritual life of worship and service.

The classes often focus on the basics of the faith, the Bible, The Book of Common Prayer, Holy Eucharist, The Sacraments, Spiritual Gifts, Stewardship, Service and more. The classes are meant to be formative for all in our community no matter what stage of life you are in. As a possible outcome, one might choose to be Confirmed as a member of the Anglican Communion by making an adult profession of faith in the Episcopal Church. If one has already been Confirmed in one of the other catholic traditions Roman Catholic or Orthodox, one may choose to be Received into the Episcopal Church as member. One can also Re-Affirm their Baptismal



Covenant at the end of the course of study if they have been baptized and would like to do so. These official actions take place when a Bishop, our own Diocesan bishop or another invited bishop visits St. Mark's for the purpose of welcoming new members deeper into the Episcopal Church through Confirmation, Reception or Re-affirmation and making a visitation to our Parish.

Over the last 3 year we've done a whole variety of things to prepare for Confirmation, Reception and Re-affirmation. We've read a both Walk in Love: Episcopal Beliefs and Practices by Scott Gunn and Melody Wilson Shobe. We've read Inspired by Rachel Held Evans. We also watched some very short but provocative videos from Animate as well as from ChurchNext that lead to a great deal of lively discussion and learning.

More recently we enjoyed a series of classes offered to our community by Professor Bruce Redford entitled Devices and Desires: The Book of Common Prayer and its Literary Legacy.

In the coming months, if you are interested in being Confirmed, Received or Re-Affirming your baptismal covenant there will opportunities for learning and preparation. Vocational Discernment

In the Episcopal Church we believe that all baptized people are called as ministers in Christ's church. As baptized people, we all share a common duty to come together weekly for corporate worship, and to work, pray, and give for the spread of the kingdom of God. In the Episcopal Church we organize our shared ministry according to several "orders": The Order of the Laity, The Order of Deacons, The Order of Priests, and The Order of Bishops. A small number of both lay and ordained ministers in the Episcopal Church are called to exercise their vocations as members or associates of religious orders or monastic communities.

For the past several years, Mother Sylvia has served as the chair of the Commission on the Ministry of the Baptized in our Diocese, and has overseen the development and implementation of a new vocational discernment process designed to support any member of the Episcopal church in our diocese (those called to lay ministries, as well as those called to ordained ministries) as they strive to discern and grow in their unique vocations as children and servants of God.

Each year's discernment cycle begins each Lent with an online Vocations Course, Wednesday evenings during Lent on Zoom. Some participants may elect to continue their exploration through participation in a Diocesan Discernment Group that meets monthly on Zoom May-December. The annual discernment cycle concludes with participation in a New Year's Discernment Weekend/Vocations Retreat. Learn more at https://dioceserg.org/vocations.
