## Beloved of God,

This past year has been filled with blessings, among the most important is the remarkable community of St. Mark's. Being part of this vibrant faith community full of deep relationships and loving care is a blessing beyond words to my family and to me. I'm also fortunate to work with a dedicated staff that genuinely loves what they do and cares deeply for our community. A special thanks to Lucy Sinkular for her joyful and effective leadership as St. Mark's Senior Warden over the past four years.

One of the things each one of us need is a community where we are loved and accepted, where the seeds of belonging have found fertile ground. We also need a place and a community where we are challenged to grow, our rough edges softened and our journey of faith brought into focus in new and life-giving ways. St. Mark's is such a place and I'm grateful to serve as one of its leaders. St. Mark's is a place we people discover belonging not only with each other but in the heart of God where we discover our true selves and flourish.

One of the greatest blessings of 2024 was my sabbatical from April to July. It allowed me to spend quality time with my family in Oregon, enjoy fishing, reconnect with old friends, and pursue hobbies like hiking, biking, and beekeeping. Maren and I also had the chance to visit our daughter Sofia in Denmark, with stops in Amsterdam, Copenhagen, and Ireland. Highlights included visiting the Anne Frank House, the Van Gogh Museum, and the Cliffs of Moher. In addition to the travel, I had time at home to read, walk the North Valley's ditch trails, and develop a more holistic Rule of Life for my spiritual practice. I am deeply grateful for this sabbatical, a gift from the St. Mark's community.

Returning to St. Mark's has been a blessing—coming home to something I've missed and feel deeply energized to lead. Many new members told me how



warm and welcoming St. Mark's was for them, how wonderful it was to find a vibrant and joyful the community to which one can belong and become involved. One new member gave me a huge hug after the Christmas Eve Eucharist and said, "I never thought that I would find a church to belong to again and I'm so happy to have found St. Mark's."

I've been taken aback at times this fall and winter to witness the "loving care that surrounds us on every side." Meals are delivered to people recovering from surgery or going through treatment through our parish Take Them A Meal ministry. More casually or organically, members in rehab and hospital are visited regularly--not just by the clergy, but by a new kind of family formed at church. I'm so grateful for the countless ways that members of the community support each other in our community and reach out in loving care. This past

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Christmas, our growing participation in the Church Unbound ministry and the special Christmas project headed up by Barbara and Michael Jupin and Sherry Reeder moved me in a profound way. Parishioners touched my heart by the great compassion and care for the faith community of First Christian Church in Colorado Springs. That community mourned the loss of their building and allowed us to purchase their organ to give it a new life at St. Mark's. A special thank you to Deb Bluestone and Pat Catlett for their hard work on the portfolio and the notes of encouragement from the St. Mark's community delivered to the First Christian Church community.

This past year a number of our faithful members passed on to the larger life, to include Mark Hendrick, Ramona Montoya, Sean Murphy, Steve Bowman, Bill Bottorf, Sally Blackstad and Paul Holzman along with parishioners' friends and family members William Leisher, Aldo Arias, JoAnn Marksbury, Holly Pence, Martha Smith and Thomas Held Jr. The people of St. Mark's celebrated the lives of each of these beautiful people with their families and friends. The sudden loss of Paul Holzman has been a great sadness for the community of St. Mark's. Paul and Gerald were relatively new to St. Mark's but close to our hearts. We will celebrate Paul's life with a memorial service on Saturday March 1, 2025, at 4pm, right before our parish Mardi Gras Party.

As I look forward to 2025, I am so moved by the strong support that St. Mark's demonstrates for our life together. I'm amazed by the growing volunteer energy that is emerging, the strengthening of outreach to our community and the continuing care for the spiritual lives of children and youth that St. Mark's is known for in the diocese. This coming year will bring new challenges and new opportunities as we walk further down the path toward renewing our facilities for a future of vitality and welcome. We will hear more about a Feasibility Study with our new partners the Vandersall Collective as we enter a process to discern where the Spirit is leading this community. I look forward to discovering the vision for the future of St. Mark's together with you.

As we move into this new year at St. Mark's, I am extremely grateful and hopeful about life and future of St. Mark's. We continue to be a vital, warm and welcoming community. We continue to attract new members and find new ways of being "church." We are not afraid to try new things, to take risks and to understand ourselves as a church with a future. We are also a church grounded in compassion and love, and we will need those gifts as we navigate a new political landscape that will need faithful people to speak truth to power and call people back to the way of Jesus, the way of love, compassion, belonging and forgiveness. There will be times we may want to despair or have become exhausted, but that is why we are part of a community where we can draw strength and courage to both resist evil and to work tirelessly for good. Together are sowing seeds of love, compassion, belonging and forgiveness and so much more. It is my prayer that together we will proclaim the good news of Jesus Christ to a hurting and broken world. Senior Warden's Report

## Dear St. Mark's Family,

As I reflect on my fourth and final year as Senior Warden, I'm filled with gratitude for this community. Serving St. Mark's has been a true honor, and I thank you all for the support and connection you've extended to me.

This year, we bid farewell to Vestry members who completed their terms: **Ty Camp** – As Junior Warden, Ty has played a vital role in maintaining our facilities and brought a steady, Christcentered presence to our Vestry discussions. **Blythe Clark** – Blythe always brings her valuable insight and advocacy as a parent of school-aged children. Her experience as a manager and engineer at Sandia has also been an asset to the Vestry. **Diane Ball** – Diane so aptly shares her perspective on high school youth, drawn from teaching and offers important, practical insights drawn from her work in our hospitality ministry. Thank you to each of these generous parishioners who shared their talent serving on the Vestry.

Each Vestry meeting begins with a meal and fellowship, followed by business. Many months, our meal includes a guest from a ministry or area of parish life. This year, Seminarian Sara Johnson, Cub Scout Pack 990 representatives, Treasurer Ken Reese and St. Mark's Montessori School Director Caitlin McGuire were among those who joined us for this time of collaboration.

# Here are some highlights from this year's Vestry work:

- January: We approved the 2024 budget, which included exciting plans for ministry growth and outreach. We also officially approved Fr. Christopher's sabbatical.
- **February:** The Vestry took a spiritual gifts assessment to better understand how our individual talents can serve the parish and identified specific areas of ministry for each member's focus in the coming year.
- March: We worked closely with Mo. Sylvia and Deacon David to plan for Fr. Christopher's Sabbatical time, Mo. Sylvia took over Clergy leadership for the SMMS School Board and the Finance Committee, while Deacon David stepped up as Clergy leader to the Vestry and the Building Renewal Committee. All during Sabbatical, Mo. Sylvia, Deacon David and I met weekly to help ensure good communication and awareness between the laity and the clergy.
- April: Excerpt from meeting minutes... "Deacon David related that St. Mark's has survived two weeks without Fr. Christopher.... There are a million things Fr. Christopher does which are being discovered each day." In April the Vestry approved a recommendation from your BRC to enter negotiations to buy the Letourneau Organ. We also revisited and refined our committee policies to improve communication and accountability across the parish.
- **May-June:** Vestry helped prepare for and participated in the Summer of Conversation while aligning some activities with the diocesan initiative. Members joined the Albuquerque Pride Parade with the LGBTQ+ Ministry of the Diocese.
- June: We kicked off the Summer of Conversation, aligning with the diocesan initiative, and joined the Albuquerque Pride Parade with the LGBTQ+ Ministry of the Diocese. This was a month full of meaningful connections and fellowship.

- July: While Vestry did not meet formally in July, we held the All-Parish Campout from July 19–21, rallied at the church on the 27th for Dumpster Clean-Up Day, and approved the organ purchase contract on July 31<sup>st</sup>!
- August: The Vestry welcomed Fr. Christopher's return from Sabbatical. We considered the distinction between operating budgets and funds designated for building renewal and worked to ensure



transparency and clarity in our financial stewardship.

- September: The Vestry voted to enter formal partnership with Luther House at UNM to undertake an important and inclusive campus ministry in which Mo. Sylvia, Deacon David and some St. Mark's students had already been actively engaged.
- October: Vestry supported the Seeds of Sanctuary stewardship campaign and the annual Oktoberfest & Hymn Sing. These events brought us together in joyful celebration and reflection on our shared mission.
- November: St. Mark's parishioner Kristina Czuchlewski facilitated a day-long Vestry retreat at the Norbertine Abbey. We broke from tradition and held the retreat later in the year to incorporate insights of outgoing Vestry members in future goals and plans.
- December: December's Vestry meeting was one of the most impactful yet. We reviewed the Finance Committee's well-crafted draft budget for 2025 and had some candid discussions—so much so that we asked Fr. Christopher to step out briefly while we openly discussed financial priorities. Vestry Member Sherry Reeder summed it up perfectly: "Our church budget should reflect our values. We value people." By consensus the Vestry requested that Treasurer Ken Reese and the Finance Committee find a way to not only include COLA raises but also increase the "market-level" raises for our talented staff. Having seen firsthand the financial and practical costs of employees departing, we want to lessen staff attrition caused by economic factors. At its **January meeting**, the Vestry passed a 2025 budget that took great strides toward this goal.

God's People: What I love most about St. Mark's is its people. I'm sure everyone has a story about someone who made you feel, without a doubt, that you belong here. For many of us, Fr. Christopher, Mo. Sylvia, or Deacon David has been "that person." On top of our fine clergy, I see all you members who not only sing beautifully on Sundays and put on a fabulous coffee hour, but who are also opening your homes when someone needs care after surgery, helping to plan a funeral and driving someone to a doctor's appointment. The love and support you extend to one another every day of the week makes this a place where we can all flourish as we comprise this part of the body of Christ known as St. Mark's.



Finance & Treasurer's Report Submitted by Ken Reese,

St. Mark's had another solid year financially in 2024. Our budget had planned for an overall surplus of \$344 while using \$20,985 of income from our investment accounts. We ended the year with a relatively small deficit of \$2361 after using the full draw of \$24,850 from the investment accounts. Since 2021, the Vestry has treated the investment account like an endowment, drawing 80% of the declared dividends which corresponds to a conservative 4% of the 5-year average account balance. St. Mark's investment accounts did quite well this year with gains of \$97,000 on top of reinvested dividends and a final balance of \$674,000.

During 2024, the church supported Father Christopher as he took his long overdue sabbatical. The Vestry has been planning for this eventuality for many years, putting away funds each month into a Sabbatical designated account. The total sabbatical costs were \$30,000, with half going into the church budget for increased hours for our remaining clergy and the other half to reimburse Father Christopher for his sabbatical expenses. At year end, the sabbatical designated account had a balance of \$16,000 and continues to grow every month for future sabbatical needs.

On the Financial report page, you will see a section referring to Designated Funds. These are funds people give in addition to their pledges, and all designated income and expenses are outside the church budget. The total balance in these funds increased \$155,000 over last year due mostly to a large increase in the balance for the organ and Building Renewal Fund (BRF). This year total donations to the organ/BRF were \$530,000, including one extremely generous, anonymous gift of \$266,000. Thank you! On the expense side, we spent \$347,000 to purchase, deinstall and store our new organ, and \$41,000 to our architect and consultants to complete our conceptual plan and begin the fund-raising feasibility study.

St. Mark's budget for 2025 is a reflection of our community's generous commitment to support our hard-working clergy and staff while providing for our projected expenses within a balanced budget. We were able to give raises to all of the staff to keep pace with cost-of-living increases and several higher raises to address equity shortfalls. The current 2025 budget results in a surplus of \$610 and uses the full draw of \$25,700 from our investment account. Our pledge goal has been increased over last year from \$590,000 to \$643,000. So far, we have received \$632,637 in pledges from 138 families. Our goal is to have 153 families make a pledge. A pledge is an indicator of our personal commitment to being good stewards of what God has given us. I urge you to prayerfully consider turning in a pledge if you have not yet done so.

Meanwhile, we decided this year's Annual Report provides the perfect opportunity to highlight the history of BRC work completed and shine a light on the next steps in the exciting process.


## **Timeline & Brief History of the Building Renewal Process**

- In **2021**, Fr. Christopher began a serious exploration of the needs of the congregation for renewed space and the potential support for such an effort.
- In *December 2021*, Liturgical Design Consultant Robert Habiger provided Fr. Christopher a written proposal for Liturgical Design Consultation Services.
- On *April 28, 2022,* Robert Habiger attended the Vestry meeting to discuss his process, services, prior experience, past projects and the liturgical and spiritual foundation for his work. On that date, the Vestry voted to retain Robert Habiger to begin work on the Preparation Phase as outlined in his December 2021 proposal.
- From *May to September 2022*, Fr. Christopher and the Vestry began to seek members for the Building Renewal Committee, whose work was expected to reach as long as five years.
- On October 20, 2022, the BRC held its first meeting, with Stretch Cole and Maribelle Ogilvie as Co-chairs; Recorder, Liz Reardon; Marcel and Stephanie Varoz, prayer team; Hospitality team of Heather Gaume and Laurel Leisher-Cabral; and members Dave Hardy, Tim McIntire, Lucy Sinkular, Jeremy Wirth and Fr. Christopher McLaren.
- In **late 2022 and early 2023**, the BRC undertook a survey of parishioners to identify their priorities and learn how interaction with our space affects worship; the BRC conducted careful analysis of the results.
- In **August of 2023**, St. Mark's hired architect Paul Barribeau of Groth Design Group of Milwaukee, WI to help us develop a Master Plan for our facility and campus and help evaluate our current space–all in preparation for the Building Renewal Project.
- On **September 22-24, 2023**, we held Congregational Meeting #1 with architect Paul Barribeau. He met with Ministry Leaders and Staff and held a Congregational meeting on Sunday. We confirmed the building's existing architectural plans for documentation and began the site review.
- On **September 26, 2023,** St. Mark's learned that the First Christian Church in Colorado Springs might possibly sell its pipe organ. The LeTourneau instrument was built in 1995, consists of 37 ranks of pipes and three manuals and is christened "Opus 42."
- On **January 14, 2024**, we held Congregational Meeting #2 with Architect Paul Barribeau and our Liturgical Design Consultant, Robert Habiger and included small group discussions.

- On **January 17, 2024**, our Acoustic Consultant came on site to complete sound testing and measurement.
- In March 2024, the committee put out RFQ's to seek a partner to serve as an "estimating contractor" for our project.
- On March 10, 2024, we held Architect Visit and Congregational Meeting #3 to present a Master Plan and Conceptual Drawings. We also viewed some initial renderings of our concept.
- On **April 4, 2024**, about 20 St. Mark's parishioners made a field trip to Colorado Springs to visit the LeTourneau organ.
- On **July 31, 2024**, we signed the Agreement for Purchase of LeTourneau Organ from First Christian Church, Colorado Springs, for \$200,000. This was an astounding opportunity because such an instrument would cost many times as much if purchased new.
- In **August of 2024**, we finalized a contract with Organ Clearing House to disassemble Opus42 and transport it to Albuquerque for storage.
- During the **Summer 2024**, the BRC found a storage facility for the LeTourneau Organ where it can safely reside until it is installed into our renewed space. Many thanks to Stretch Cole for his essential research and hours of on-the-ground work.
- On **December 1, 2024**, Greg and Noralyn Hassold, Stretch Cole, Deb Bluestone, and Harrison Higgins formed a delegation from St. Mark's that traveled to Colorado Springs and attended a special service for the Decommissioning of Opus 42. They brought the First Christian congregation a special portfolio created by Pat Catlett and Deb Bluestone and personal notes from St. Mark's to First Christian members.
- On **December 2, 2024,** our organ consultant Scott Reidell and principal organist Jeremy Wirth inspected Opus 42 in Colorado Springs prior to its disassembly by contract.



- On **December 5**, **2024**, St. Mark's Vestry approved a Feasibility Study contract with Vandersall Collective. The choice came after interviewing the two finalists for this work and interviewing many clients of both firms.
- From **December 2-18, 2024**, Organ Clearing House disassembled Opus 42 for its move to storage at the cost of \$210,000.
- On **December 21, 2024**, Opus 42 arrived in Albuquerque and was securely placed in its storage facility at Slater Transfer and Storage.
- On **January 1, 2025**, a working group comprised of BRC members, clergy and other parishioners began work on the fundraising feasibility study with Vandersall Collective.



- Looking ahead, on **February 23, 2025**, St. Mark's will hold a parish-wide meeting during adult-education time to introduce the capital campaign feasibility study process, the next step towards our building renewal.
- Then on **March 5, 2025**, Vandersall Collective will mail its fundraising feasibility study survey to every household.
- Later in **March 2025**, Vandersall will conduct in-person interviews with a cross-section of parishioners for the feasibility study.

**Well! Look at that timeline!** After more than *three years* of preliminary work, we are ready to move into a new phase of our Building Renewal project. We've created a Master Plan that encompasses projects to address our important needs and to accomplish goals for a renewed worship space. We've held three Congregational meetings to both keep the parish informed and to learn their priorities and special interests in the building renewal effort. The Building Renewal Committee continues to work in support of the parish's established core values: accessibility, flexibility, centrality of music with maintenance of an organ as a key element, balancing continuity of tradition with needs for the future, and ensuring beauty in this proposed renovation work for the thriving of the St. Mark's community.

Our purchase of the high-quality Letourneau pipe organ, Opus 42, from First Christian Church in Colorado Springs to replace our ailing 1958 Reuter pipe organ marked a big step forward. That purchase solidifies traditional music and a growing music program as priorities of our members. Next, the projects and ideas gleaned from the Building Renewal Committee's work among our parishioners will come before the entire congregation for discernment. See this brief description of the upcoming feasibility study guided by the Vandersall Collective.

## Feasibility Study Coming Soon - Read, Pray, and Respond

On Sunday, February 23, 2025, St. Mark's will hold a parish-wide meeting during adulteducation time to introduce the capital campaign feasibility study process, the next step towards our building renewal. The feasibility phase is an opportunity to hear directly from you as we discern the willingness and ability of our members to support a capital campaign. It is time to build trust within our community about levels of interest, levels of support, and to discover where the Spirit is at work in our midst as we create a place for St. Mark's to flourish.

Around March 5, 2025, Vandersall Collective will mail its fundraising feasibility study survey to every household with a consistent giving or pledging history. Anyone else interested who is without a giving or pledging history can request a survey by contacting Vandersall. Later in March, Vandersall will conduct in-person interviews with a cross-section of parishioners for the feasibility study. Look for feasibility surveys and a case statement outlining the project to hit your mailboxes or inboxes in early March 2025.

Please take time to *read, pray,* and *respond* to these invitations for input. We hope this vision for a building that is more welcoming, functional, and supportive of our mission as followers of Jesus will resonate with you. Stewarding all our resources, including the building that houses our ministries, is a vital part of our shared life as a church. We are eager to discern how each of us can contribute to this work.


Ministry Updates - Within the Walls...

God is creating a sanctuary of growth and belonging among, within, and through us. Below you will find reports from *just a handful* of St. Mark's *many* ministries. Read on for a glimpse of what God has been doing in 2024 both *within and beyond* the walls of St. Mark's.

Within the Walls...Building Renewal Committee & Organ Project

In preparation for the renewal of our church building, St. Mark's has purchased a previously owned pipe organ to be installed in the nave once the building renewal is complete. The organ was built by the Letourneau Organ Company of Quebec, Canada in 1996 and installed in the First



Christian Church of Colorado Springs, Colorado. In 2023 the First Christian Church voted to sell their building and move to a new location. They then came to the conclusion that the Letourneau organ needed to be sold separately from the building and began to seek a buyer. On April 4, 2024 a contingent of about 20 St. Mark's parishioners traveled to Colorado Springs to examine the instrument. In consultation with organ consultant Scott Riedel of Milwaukee, Wisconsin, leaders of our parish agreed to purchase the instrument and move it to Albuquerque. Attorney/parishioners Lucy Sinkular and Jeremy Wirth worked with an attorney for First Christian Church to negotiate an agreement, which was finalized in the summer of 2024 with a purchase price of \$200,000. The parish then entered into an agreement with the Organ Clearinghouse of Newcastle, Maine, to remove the organ from the church in Colorado Springs and place it in storage at Slater Moving and Storage in Albuquerque. That work was accomplished during December 2024. The organ now waits in

storage for the church building to be prepared for its installation. The leaders of the parish hope to enter a contract with the Letourneau Organ Company, which built the instrument, to install it in St. Mark's in 2026.

Within the Walls...St. Mark's Montessori School Submitted by Caitlin McGuire

St. Mark's Montessori School serves children ages 18 months to 6 years of age and currently have about 50 students enrolled. We provide an environment that is safe and engaging for the children to explore. Our teachers monitor for sensitive periods for the student's growth and interests. True to Dr. Montessori's method, we are always looking for new ways to nurture curiosity and growth in our students.

St. Mark's Montessori School achieved 3 stars in our FOCUS program in May '24 and will continue to pursue 4 stars while carefully following our Montessori pedagogy. We installed Astroturf around our cement playground and are working to install a watering system so that our lovely ponderosa pine continues to get sufficient oxygen and water. Our Toddler program has expanded giving us 20 Toddler enrollment spots! We have updated the playground door handle to improve security and are looking to improve the shade over our sand playground. The current bid range is \$8,300.



In August, we won a 'Sprout' award from New Mexico Grown Coalition for our garden and food education activities. In 2025, our mission is to continue to provide an outstanding environment for children and teachers to work in together.

Parishioners can get involved with St. Mark's Montessori School through sharing their skills, participating on our School Board, and material and monetary donations!

If you are a musician, artisan, scientist, performer, community helper, health professional, educator, or skilled professional, we would enjoy you sharing your skills and knowledge with our school! Please reach out and we can coordinate with what you would be interested in sharing. Crafters or artisans can help us repair well-loved materials, books, and furniture. Community members are now invited to come into the school on scheduled days to read and donate a book to the children.

Current School Board members are: Dinah Pierotti, Robin Hammer, Ken Reese, Christopher McLaren, Maren McLaren, Nancy Hilton, LeeAnna Sacoman, and Frances Chaves & Bryan Kaiser as our Parent Representatives. We meet once monthly to discuss school direction and growth.

Parishioners can also support our school through monetary contributions and material donations. Christmas Basket Raffle purchases are very impactful for our school. A Spring

Within the Walls...Holden Evening Prayer Submitted by Jeremy Wirth

The history of the Church offers a long tradition of morning and evening prayer liturgies, separate from the Eucharistic tradition. These devotional services have taken countless forms over the centuries. During 2024 St. Mark's Church experimented with evening prayer services on Wednesday evenings. During the summer we used the Holden Evening Prayer liturgy. During the early fall, parishioner Kirk Landin led chant-based evening prayer services. During the Advent season we again used Holden Evening Prayer. In 2025 we plan to hold evening prayer services during some seasons of the year, while allowing for breaks during some seasons.

In 2024, the Sacred Arts Guild (SAG) continued its mission of supporting St. Mark's ministries and community presence through art. Within the Walls... Spiritual Formation for Adults: Small Groups & Classes Submitted by Mother Sylvia

God continues to cultivate a sanctuary of growth and belonging among adults in our community through a variety of classes and small group offerings.

In 2024 Father Christopher led a Lenten Study on



Prophetic Lament: A Call for Justice in Troubled Times by Soong-Chan Rah and an Advent Study on Answering God: The Psalms as Tools for Prayer by Eugene Peterson, in addition to his popular ongoing Sunday morning "(Not Just For) Newcomers" class, inspired by Scott Gunn's book, Walk in Love: Episcopal Beliefs and Practices.

In Lent we hosted our first parish-wide "Funeral Planning Party" and seminarian Sara Johnson facilitated a <u>Way of Love</u> class.

During the Summer, in addition to our annual "Summer of Conversation" program, we hosted a "Summer Sanctuary Series" in which several members shared their personal experiences of finding sanctuary through music, prayer, and service.

In August, Laurie LeBrecque introduced The Difference Course to St. Mark's, and helped facilitate sessions throughout the summer and fall at St. Mark's focusing on 3 spiritual habits (Be Curious, Be Present, Reimagine) to help us navigate conflict and disagreement with faith and hope.

This Fall we welcomed Kelley and Ric Tredwin of Altalune Wealth Advisors to offer two initial "Giving Makes You Happy" Workshops, as a way of beginning to provide tools to help our members cultivate financial health as one aspect of overall spiritual health.

In Fall of 2024 Mother Sylvia also launched two new Spiritual Support Groups that meet monthly on Saturday mornings at St. Mark's. Our Parenting Group and Eldering Group each provide spaces for honest sharing and mutual support among folks doing the hard spiritual and practical work of parenting or eldering (or both!)

Throughout the year, small groups enjoyed watching Seasons 2 & 3 of <u>The Chosen</u>, reading the Gospel of Mark in the First Nations Version of the Bible, exploring Sufi Prayer Practices and "Praying the Names of God" with Mary Catherine Casey, Contemplative Prayer gatherings with Father Michael Jupin, Praying the Anglican Rosary every Tuesday on Zoom, Storytelling w/Harriet Cole, Seasonal Morning Prayer and Yoga with Mother Sylvia, and a study of the "The Strangest Prayer" (aka the Lord's Prayer) with Karen Pound.

In 2025 our "Thursday Bible Study" Group (which meets every Thursday from 12-1:30pm is already planning to explore a variety of texts, including: <u>The Wisdom Pattern: Order,</u> <u>Disorder, Reorder by Richard Rohr</u> and <u>Circle of Grace: A Book of Blessings for the Seasons</u> by Jan Richardson during Epiphany, <u>Reading Genesis by Marilynne Robinson</u> and <u>Spirituality</u> <u>of the Psalms by Walter Brueggemann</u> in Lent, <u>Whistling in the Dark: A Doubters Diary</u> by Frederick Buechner and various resources for healing in Eastertide.

We encourage you to participate in classes and groups at St. Mark's, and discover the growth and belonging that comes from studying, sharing, and praying together in a small group!

Ministry Update - Beyond the Walls...

Beyond the Walls...Church Unbound Submitted by Barbara & Michael Jupin, Also Joan Camera, Richard Meadows, and Sherry Reeder

The Diocese of the Rio Grande and its Ministry to the Homeless and Displaced developed **Church Unbound** to establish a Christian worship service without walls for those without and with shelter. Members of this ministry believe that to address spiritual needs on the streets of Albuquerque we must meet people "where they are" by engaging in mutual relationship building and practical hands-on ministry. The Rev. Dr. Chloe Chavez, Diocesan Missioner, oversees this ministry.

Church Unbound meets every Sunday (except the Sunday after Christmas), rain or shine, from 1:30 to 2:30 p.m. in the Albuquerque Inn parking lot (7640 Central SE) across from the International District Public Library. Fellowship (with the distribution of bags of a sandwich, fruit, and treats) at 1:30 p.m. precedes an abbreviated service of Holy Communion at 2:00 p.m.

St. Mark's had a humble beginning in its participation in Church Unbound. The first sandwiches were defrosted peanut butter and jelly. Soon we were preparing 100-120 sliced ham or turkey and cheese sandwiches with both mayo and mustard. While sandwiches were being prepared in the kitchen, in the undercroft snack bags were being filled with a piece of fruit, chips, and a sweet treat. There, too, in the undercroft, the sandwiches were refrigerated overnight.



On Sunday morning the sandwiches are added to the snack bags and loaded into the cars of volunteers to be transported to the Church Unbound site (now the Albuquerque Inn). Before long donated clothing - especially warm pants and jackets - were added to the delivery of sandwich bags.

This past year a special Christmas gift was created for and given to street ministry participants: 108 Christmas stockings sewn by eight St. Mark's members and filled with candies (including candy canes), hand warmers, warm socks, tissue packets, and chap sticks, given by many, many church members. Another surprise gift came through St. Mark's business manager Laura Blum. Through her



membership in Keep America Warm – we received almost a hundred each of knitted hats and handwoven scarves. What a gift! Thank you, Laura. Two members and the Outreach Committee ("Matthew 25") also purchased a "Pop-up" Tent Canopy to give shade and shelter to the volunteers and ministry participants.

This year we look to add homemade baked cookies as the sweet treat in the sandwich bags and develop a corp of sewers to create mittens from repurposed used sweaters, while also

continuing the "tradition" of stuffed Christmas stockings.

In 2023, St. Mark's accepted an invitation to partner with La Mesa Presbyterian Church to host their annual Feast of Hope. The Feast of Hope is a dinner served on Thanksgiving Day to anyone who wants to take part. It is designed especially for anyone who does not have the means or place to have a traditional Thanksgiving dinner.

In 2024, La Mesa expanded the invitation and 12 different churches throughout the city joined the event. This year, each parish was given the



opportunity to lead one aspect of the Feast. St. Mark's volunteered to work on procurement of supplies needed. Two weeks before Thanksgiving, three shopping experts from St. Mark's joined Deacon David in buying food and serving supplies. It is our intent to have the same position next year. Having been in charge of procurement once, we've figured out a system.

There are opportunities to help with the Feast of Hope in food preparation the three days before Thanksgiving and then on Thanksgiving Day as well. If you are interested in any aspect of the Feast of Hope, please contact Deacon David.

Beyond the Walls...Pastoral and Eucharistic Visits Submitted by Deacon David Martin,

Eucharistic Visits were plentiful in 2024. Eucharist Visitors are given a kit with the elements of bread and wine at the end of our worship service on Sunday mornings. Some people receive Eucharistic visit each month as the person cannot attend church. But there is also a need for temporary visits when someone is sick or can't make it to church for any reason.

These visits are pastoral in nature – bringing warmth and friendship to people who are not able to get out into the world as often as they would like. As a community, we are also able to determine special needs of those we visit and can help when it is needed.

As planned for 2024, each person receiving Eucharistic Visits was assigned a specific Sunday of each month. This plan was implemented to make sure everyone received a visit and to make the visits easier to track. However, after a few months, it became clear this brilliant idea was not sustainable. People being visited have unexpected interruptions. There are two difficulties with planning Eucharistic Visits. The schedule is planned a month in advance so the visitors can plan their calendar accordingly. But the people being visited often cancel at the last minute – leaving someone ready to make a Eucharistic Visit with no one to see.

The second difficulty is the number of visitors required. We added four new visiting teams to our roster in 2024. But the demand for Eucharistic visits is growing. St. Mark's could use even more people interested in taking communion to people who can't make it to church.

Beyond the Walls...Open Table Connection (Luther House) Campus Ministry Submitted by Deacon David Martin

St. Mark's was invited to join the expansion of Luther House Campus Ministry this year. We readily accepted the invitation.

The new campus ministry is called Open Table. It is an inter-denominational approach to reaching young people on college campuses across the country. Open Table is a progressive and inclusive Christian Ministry. All denominations are welcome and encouraged to participate.

Open Table has an on-campus pastor, Rhonda Newby-Torres, in the facility near the west end of campus. St. Mark's clergy has worked with Rhonda in the past and were eager to join her in this new Open Table fellowship.

Mother Sylvia and Deacon David alternate weeks and attend Open Table Thursday night gatherings. We meet at 5:00 for

dinner and conversation. It has been fulfilling to hear college students share their triumphs and struggles with each other. After dinner there is a program offering thoughts and insights on Christianity. This year, we are exploring how different theologies impact our Christian faith. The evening concludes at 7:30 with the Eucharist.

St. Mark's is talking with the Global Education Office at UNM about hosting Culture Nights in our St. Mark's facility. Culture Nights offer UNM students from other countries an opportunity to join others with similar cultures to be reminded of home and enjoy community in a familiar setting.

St. Mark's has made a financial commitment to Open Table at UNM. We then have a position on the board. Ryan Kangas is St. Mark's board member. If you have any questions or want further information about Open Table Campus Ministry, please contact Mother Sylvia or Deacon David.





Beyond the Walls...Camp Stoney and Diocesan Youth Programs Submitted by Alex Miller-Mutia

Members of St. Mark's are both experiencing and helping create a sanctuary of growth and belonging beyond the walls of St. Mark's through active participation and leadership in Camp Stoney and other Diocesan Youth Programs.

In 2024 we in the Diocese of the Rio Grande welcomed the Rev. Le Anna Brun

) as our new Missioner for Christian Formation. Le Anna+ provides leadership and oversight for Camp Stoney, Youth Formation, and Young Adult programs for our diocese.



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In 2024 I (Alex Miller-Mutia) was honored to serve as Head Counselor for Camp Stoney and as an adult chaperone and leader for several other diocesan youth events.

### Highlights of our ministry in 2024 included:

### Camp Stoney ....

- Intergenerational family camps and 2 regular camp weeks
- Young adult staff took charge of program planning and leadership
- Reintroducing the low ropes activities to the camp program

- Ice skating in Santa Fe
- One participant had such a good time they signed up for summer camp and brought their younger siblings

### Taos Trip ...

- Connected kids from Taos, Española, Santa Fe, and Albuquerque
- New people who had never attended any diocesan events
- Hiked up to Williams Lake
- Community meal and tour during our visit to Hanuman Temple

My favorite part of these events is watching teens connect with each other and come out of their shells. There's something special about giving them the chance to just have fun for a week or weekend. Playing goofy games, enjoying nature, and making new friends, all away from the pressures of technology and daily stress. Overnight trips seem to magically break down the social barriers that often weigh heavily on kids and teens. I've seen deep friendships form in just a two-day weekend trip.

On the Taos trip, we did an activity where we sat in a circle, and people could voluntarily share things they appreciated about each other. These kids had known each other for less than 24 hours, but we had to limit the affirmations just to keep things moving! It was incredibly moving to see how quickly they recognized and celebrated each other's strengths.

I feel very privileged to help facilitate and support these experiences by working and volunteering at these events. It's truly rewarding to witness and be a part of these moments.

Plans are already underway for this new year's diocesan programs for youth and young adults, including Camp Stoney 2025, including:

- June 12-15 Family Camp (intergenerational)
- June 15-21 Classic Camp Session 1 (Grades 3-10)
- June 22-28 Classic Camp Session 2 (Grades 3-10)

The music of St. Mark's was led by an expanding team of musicians in 2024. The members of the choir continue to provide faithful and tireless service to the parish. The Choir led the music of every Sunday liturgy during the year. The Choir also sang in numerous special liturgies, including Ash Wednesday, Tenebrae, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, the Great Vigil of Easter, and many others. The choir sang at both services on Christmas Eve, leading both the 5:00 and 8:00 Eucharists. The choir continues to facilitate the singing of the traditional choral repertoire and hymns of the Episcopal Church, while constantly experimenting with new styles, as found in *Gather* and other resources.

The Choir continues to grow and flourish. The choir welcomed several new members this year and seeks to provide a warm welcome and helpful resources to new singers. Several soloists from the choir sang psalms and other liturgical music in various services. Members of the choir also provided solos on Christmas Eve and other occasions. The choir was especially proud of their performance of the *Litany to the Virgin Mary* by Mozart during Advent. Taylor Spence served faithfully as Choir Librarian, assisted by Natalie Adolphi.

The Choir welcomed Patrick Dill, DMA, as its director in the fall of 2024. Patrick and his family moved to Albuquerque during the summer to accept a position in the University of New Mexico Department of Music, where Patrick teaches choral music education.

John Garlisch continues to serve as Assistant Organist. John leads some choir rehearsals and plays the organ primarily in Jeremy's absence, but on some occasions Jeremy and John lead services together. John has also played at a variety of special parish events. The flourishing of the choir is also made possible by other leaders such as Jeremy Wirth, Hannah Stephens, Kelli Dahlke-Fuentes, Jacqueline Zander-Wall, and Gabriel Deyarmond. The choir is a community and a team, and members constantly step in to help and support one another.

While welcoming several new members, the choir said goodbye to Carolyn Huff. Carolyn sang in our choir for a few years while serving as a hospital chaplain in Albuquerque. #### St Mark's Episcopal Church Minutes of Annual Meeting Held January 28, 2024

This year's annual meeting was incorporated into Sunday worship. The Parish received the document "St. Mark's Episcopal Church 2023 Annual Parish Report "*Rekindle the Gift of God that is Within You*," which included written reports on various ministries. This report is appended to these *Minutes*.

#### Meeting Within the Liturgy

- 1. A special Collect for the Day and Annual Meeting was offered at the beginning of liturgy.
- 1. For the Sermon, Fr. Christopher McLaren delivered the Rector's Report.
- 2. The Prayers of the People included special blessings and thanksgiving for all lay and ordained ministers involved in serving God's people in our Parish and beyond.
- 0. Following the Peace, Treasurer Miranda Eastham gave the Stewardship, Finance, and Budget Reports.

#### 76th Annual Business Meeting

- 0. Following Holy Communion and the Post-Communion Prayer, Rector Christopher McLaren called to order the business portion of the Annual Meeting. Parishioners remained in their pews in the sanctuary for the remainder of the agenda.
- 0. Clerk of the Vestry Deb Bluestone was appointed Secretary of Annual Meeting. A motion was made, seconded, and passed by acclamation.
- <u>Election</u>: Deb Bluestone, Steve Hayden, and Sherry Reeder were nominated to fill three vacancies on the Vestry for three-year terms. Scott Sinkular was nominated as the Parish Delegate to the Diocesan Convention. The election was conducted by paper ballot during the meeting.
- 8. The Annual Meeting Minutes for January 29, 2023 were received, a committee of the Vestry having previously approved them at the February 2023 Vestry meeting.
- 9. <u>Acceptance of Annual Report</u>: The Parish officially accepted all Financial Reports and Leadership Reports in the Annual Report as presented. A motion was made, seconded, and passed by acclamation.

- 10. Senior Warden Report: Lucy Sinkular briefly addressed the congregation with a personal reflection, encouraging members to consider their own call as a lay person to find a place of belonging and contribution in Christ's work at St. Mark's.
- 11. SMMS Report St. Mark's Montessori School Director Caitlin McGuire's report to the congregation included updates on enrollment and efforts to create an increasingly strong foundation for children going into first grade. SSMS is currently taking steps to implement the New Mexico preschool FOCUS program, qualifying the school for other grants and resources. Community members are encouraged to share their skills and knowledge with the children by teaching and demonstrating. Parishioners can also support the school through monetary contributions to the online Montessori Material Registry.
- 12. Election Results: Ty Camp, the Junior Warden, brought results of the paper balloting forward to Fr. Christopher, resulting in the election of Deb Bluestone, Steve Hayden, and Sherry Reeder to the Vestry and Scott Sinkular as the Parish Delegate to the Diocesan Convention.
- 13. Adjournment: Following announcements, Fr. Christopher adjourned the meeting at 11:18 a.m.
